Organization

- Founded as an autonomous division in 1980
- · Established as a department in 1987

Faculty & Staff

- · 61 full-time paid core FCM faculty
- 3 members of The Institute of Medicine
- Rank: 23 Professors, 20 Associate Professors, and 17 Assistant Professors
- Primary activity of faculty: 37 Clinical, 19 Research/Sponsored Activity, 4 Teaching, and 1 Administrative
- 28 faculty based at San Francisco General Hospital (SFGH)
- 7 faculty with affiliated appointments at the Osher Center for Integrative Medicine or the Philip R. Lee Institute for Health Policy Studies
- 9 non-faculty academics
- 305 volunteer clinical faculty most teach at affiliated residencies
- 147 paid staff

Medical Student Education

- Department co-directs first- and second-year Foundations of Patient Care Course and Directs six-week required family medicine third-year clerkship
- Department offers wide variety of electives, including preceptorships and research assistantships
- Department plays leadership role in the Program in Medical Education for the Urban Underserved (PRIME-US)
- Department faculty coordinate the MD-MPH program
- Department faculty include 7 members of UCSF Academy of Medical Educators

Residencies

- Central residency program at SFGH includes 45 residents and 3 fourth-year chief residents, and features outstanding community linkages, a cross-cultural curriculum, and training for urban underserved areas; half of the graduates practice in underserved settings
- 5 affiliated family medicine residencies in Fresno, Martinez, Vallejo, Salinas and Santa Rosa, include 144 residents

Clinical Activities

- SF General Hospital: Family Health Center (55,000 visits/year), Urgent Care Center, Family Medicine Inpatient Service, Attending Deliveries at Birth Center, Skilled Nursing Facility
- UCSF Health: Ambulatory practices at Family Medicine Center at Lakeshore (19,080 visits/year), UCSF Center for Geriatric Care (4,362 visits/year), UCSF Primary Care Laurel Village, Women's Health Primary Care

Research

- Major areas of study include primary care practice innovation, health disparities and social determinants of health, patientclinician relationship, integrative medicine, team-based care, family planning, health workforce, and diabetes
- Department collaborates with Department of Medicine in directing the UCSF Primary Care Research Fellowship
- The San Francisco Bay Area Collaborative Research Network is a primary health care practice-based research network that involves hundreds of primary care clinicians
- Helps direct the Clinical and Translational Science Institute's Community Engagement and Health Policy Program and its SF Health Improvement Partnership initiative
- Total faculty research grant awards exceeded \$5.1 million in FY2013-2014

Extramural Contracts & Grants

 Extramural grants and contracts awarded to faculty totaled \$16.3 million (direct and indirect) in FY2013-14, including research, service and training

Other Activities

- HIV focus: The Clinician Consultation Center (CCC) provides expert phone consultation for healthcare providers on HIV/AIDS, PrEP, and bloodborne pathogen exposures; Pacific AIDS Education and Training Center, Center of Excellence for Transgender Health, and International Training and Education Center on Health build capacity for HIV prevention and care, locally, regionally, and globally
- Office of Developmental Primary Care builds capacity in clinical service, advocacy, research and training for people with developmental disabilities
- Transitions Clinic establishes a medical home for individuals with chronic diseases recently released from prison
- Training: 2 major CME courses per year; faculty development program for faculty throughout Northern California; communitybased training in health coaching and practice coaching by Center for Excellence in Primary Care
